LITERARY / GOOD READ RATING

The literary value rating measures the quality of a book out of 5. For example, how well written.

The good read rating measures how enjoyable a book is out of 5. Our reviewers choose this rating from the viewpoint of the target audience, rather than as an adult.


Dyslexia Friendly: The book is likely to have yellower pages, serif fonts, and more white space.

Reluctant Reader: A book designed for a reluctant reader is a book that is specifically created to engage and encourage individuals who may be hesitant or unenthusiastic about reading. It is a rapid read for kids who don't enjoy reading or have reading difficulties (and might have more visuals).

Low Page Density: This book is likely to have more white space and fewer words per page, readers may find it easier to comprehend and retain information.


NOVEL INSIGHT REVIEW

Emit tries everything he can think of to get more time, he tries to catch it, wait for it, but it's not until Emit tries to buy some time that he learns the secret which is, if you want time, you have to make it.

NOVEL INSIGHT REVIEW

It seems like no-one ever has enough time for Emit—it's always slipping away, running out, or simply passing by. On a quest to find some time, Emit tries standing still, looking in museums for precious things, using a net to catch it (since it flies), and even goes to a charity shop to buy it. But the volunteer there tells him something that he'll remember forever: if you want time, you'll have to make it. Emit goes back to his family and they start making "quality"

time"—a clock shop that they all work in together. Full of funny wordplay and aphorisms, this quirky book emphasises the importance of spending time on important things. The rich, rainbow-coloured watercolour illustrations show Emit trying all kinds of things to find some time, and the dry, warm humour of the narration is sure to make readers laugh.



She flies out to find it, and is joined by a brave kangaroo, a wise emu and two kind quolls. Their search leads them to a bowerbird's nest of blue treasures, but the mischievous bowerbird refuses to return it. Suddenly, a gust of wind destroys the bowerbird's nest until only the feather remains. Devestated, the bowerbird returns the feather but the black cockatoo looks to her friends, realising that she doesn't need it to be special. She offers the feather to the grateful bowerbird, and the animals return home through the bush. A sublimely illustrated modern-day fable with a valuable message about confidence, identity and friendship.







They ask their parents if he can see them from space, and are told that he can only see large landmarks like the Pyramids, Amazon River and the Grand Canyon. The children devise a plan for their entire city to turn on their lights so the astronaut can see them. That night many lights are turned on and the astronaut, seeing the brightness from space, transmits a message thanking them for turning on their lights.



Soon, more and more fly over to see him. The boy says that he was raised by moths and that they looked after him until he was three. He says that some children are raised by animals, but that most of them won't remember. Suddenly the Ferris wheel works again and the two return to the ground with their family. As they leave the boy points to the big field near the fairground. The little girl goes to the field and finds a tiny horseshoe in her pocket. 

Miserable, Chico searches for his bag. He gets lost and panics, but thankfully, finds his way home. Grandpa is impressed. Grandpa tells Chico he does not have to be afraid and takes him exploring. Chico finds lots of incredible plants in the desert jungle. Even scary animals can be beautiful. When Chico starts exploring on his own, he finds that there are lots of treasures to be found. During a storm, Chico runs into a cave for shelter, but Chico is not alone. He is confronted by a dangerous coyote. Thankfully, when Chico turns away, the coyote disappears. Making it safely home, Chico tells his worried grandpa about the coyote. When Chico returns to his village, he has a newfound love for his desert home. 

When the farmers arrived, they burned trees and drained the swamps to expand the crop fields. The ibis went into urban areas to become 'bin chicken' scavengers. Without ibis to control the locust population, numbers increased, and locusts began feeding on crops, hoses and washing. In the current day, pesticides drop from planes to control the population, killing the locusts and the bush birds that feed on them. However, the pesticides are not always effective, and the locusts continue to grow. The locusts lament the pesticides and note that, in the past, people cared for Country. The perspective of the locusts combined with effective imagery creates an evocative, educational story suitable for classrooms. Contains an author's note at the back of the book, which explains the history of locust plagues.



He fills his cloak pockets with blue, takes it home, and adds it to his growing collection. Even though Satin is happy, he feels like something is missing. One morning, Satin has to walk further than usual to find blue. He finds a remote house but hopes to avoid the people inside. As he turns to leave, Satin hears the word blue. A child is talking to a teddy about her mother. Satin understands why her mother is feeling blue. She needs blue. When the child is called away, Satin leaves a piece of blue on the windowsill. He returns home, suddenly realising what has been missing. He takes his collection of blue around the houses and leaves pieces for others. At the final house, Satin meets a woman who has blue in her hair and her throat. She invites Satin inside, filling his heart with the gladness of blue. Etta turns to the spirit tree for guidance and is shown the importance of respecting the personal space of others – and the value of having her own personal space – and after apologising to her baawaa, swears to always ask herself:

The spirit tree knows
The spirit tree cares
Where is my shadow?

And where is theirs?

NOVEL INSIGHT REVIEW

When the spirit tree notices that Etta is sad, it asks her what is wrong. Etta's older sister has screamed at her to go away because Etta has stood on her shadow several times. The spirit tree tells Etta that we must not stand on shadows because shadows feel pain too. To help Etta learn the lesson of the Shadow Taboo, the spirit tree temporarily turns Etta into a shadow. Etta goes to her Gunii, but her Gunii cannot hear her. Instead, her Gunii's shadow replies. It tells Etta that stepping on a shadow is a crime and shadows will play mean tricks on people who do! But if Etta's sorry, they won't play mean tricks on her. Etta is very sorry and promises to always look out for other people's shadows. A captivating rhyming story about respecting the personal space of others with beautiful red, orange, and black illustrations.
